Gunther Dohse was a career Marine who changed his religious denomination on his dog tags from P (Protestant) to U (Unitarian) in 1960. In the 70’s, he traded in a company of Marines for a platoon of fifth graders, who taught him the important lessons that war and the university neglected to teach. He graduated from gardening for food survival to gardening for soul survival.

Growth News

The Building Design/Construction Committee (BDCC) voted unanimously this month to select Wallyworks, with Malcolm Dorn and John Edwards, as the general contractor to construct our new building. Those who worked with Malcolm on the present structure are delighted to have him with us again. Two of his particular skills are working with volunteers and controlling costs. This latter will keep him busy for the next two months as he works with Richard's design to come up with a cost estimate that will tell us how much we can afford to build during Phase One of the project and what will have to wait a few years until we can gather the resources to create Phase Two.

Richard is working with the committee on pulling together his attractive concept drawings with our program needs. These drawings will be the subject of a congregational discussion on Sunday, June 3, immediately after the second service. Be sure to attend so that you can contribute your input and listen to others' ideas.

As the work continues, any input you have to offer should be directed to Irv Mortensen, who will act as the conduit to architect and contractor.

The summer's work will finish the schematics and costing, and we will vote in September on the final design. The fall and early winter will be taken up with details of the building design, getting the necessary permits, and purchasing the city-owned street vacation that divides our property.

When construction begins early next year, Malcolm will offer a continuously updated list of tasks that volunteers can sign up for. There will be many, and everyone who wants to help will find something within his or her skill level.

Remember, we're not just putting up a structure, we're building our community!

While this project is just getting started it has already reached several milestones, including producing *Listening to Women* a community forum on women's health issues, getting their 501(c)3 tax exempt status, hiring executive director Alison Ryan, and receiving grant funding from Rotary to present a series of workshops to help women learn to advocate for their own health. 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**2007 QUUF Bylaws Committee
Report to the Board
May, 2007**

Committee Members: Linda Little, Megan Cate and David Alveraz

Our Task as Defined in 2002 Bylaws

“Proposed amendments and proposed revisions shall be referred to a **Board appointed bylaws committee for study and review**. Changes made shall be returned to the Board for approval and recommendation to the Fellowship. The Fellowship shall be notified as described in **Article IV, Section 3** prior to the (annual) meeting when a vote on the proposed amendment is scheduled...An affirmative two-thirds majority vote cast by the voting members present and voting is required to amend or revise these bylaws **Article XI** (pages 11-12).”

Definitions

“Bylaw Amendments are incidental corrections and Bylaw Revisions are major re-writes of these bylaws” (**Article XI**, page 11). Our committee with input from Board Chair, Kendra Golden; John Collins, Trustee; Lynn Taylor, Treasurer; and, Special Funds Committee Members addressed both minor edits and substantive changes to the existing bylaws. Committee Members met to work on these revisions beginning January, 2007. We ended our assignment by posting proposed revisions to the bylaws on the QUUF web page, and by presenting a power point presentation to interested members of the fellowship following the second service on Sunday, May 6, 2007. Approximately 20 members attended this meeting, and their comments (though minor) were also passed on to the Board. That presentation (in outline form) is attached to this Committee Report. It specifies examples of minor proposed changes (Amendments) and substantive proposed changes (Revisions).

Proposed Revisions to 2002 Bylaws

Minor edits (proposed amendments) to create consistency in use of terms, capitalization and tense were performed. Sections of existing bylaws were reorganized to capture previous revisions into the body of the bylaws document.

The substantive changes (revisions) proposed by this Committee include:

1. **Procedures for Review of Financial Statements.** **Article VII Section 4** (page 7 of 2002 bylaws) stated,| “An auditor chosen by the Board shall annu-

ally examine these accounts,” was changed to **Article V, Section 5** (page 4) to lessen the requirement to “an annual review by a person or committee deemed qualified by the Board to review the financial statements of the Fellowship for form and accuracy, and to submit a written report of findings to the Board.”

2. **Specifying requirements for receipt and expenditure of special funds.** The 2002 bylaw revision that mandated the establishment of a Special Funds Committee was incorporated into the body of the proposed bylaws (**Article V Section 6**). Two distinct funds are identified based upon intentions of donor and the use of either principal or interest of funds. Definitions and restrictions for use of both a **Development Fund (Article V Section 6)** and a **Permanent Endowment Fund (Article V Section 7)** are specified.
3. **Establishment of a quorum for the Board of Trustees (Article VI Section 4).** Six members (instead of five) shall constitute a quorum requiring a four (4) plus affirmative vote for action to be taken.
4. **Provision for removal of a trustee by the congregation at a special meeting called for this purpose (Article VI Section 4).**
5. **Provision for the Creation of a youth liaison Board position (non-voting) (Article VI Section 7) to provide more youth connections with the Fellowship.**
6. **Provision that the Board no longer appoint all committee members (Article VII Section 1B).**
7. **Provision to allow for the appointment of assistant treasurers (Article VII Section 5F) for special duties identified by the Board.** This is a current practice that is not provided for in existing bylaws.
8. **Eliminate the concept of “Standing” Committees (Article VIII Section 1).**
9. **Nominating Committee not only submit a slate of candidates for Board and Special Funds Committee, but for the Nominating Committee as well (Article VIII Section 2).**
10. **Provision for alternative ways of amending bylaws (beyond the appointment of a bylaws committee on a five (5) year basis to include the Board’s ability to propose changes at either the Annual Meeting or a Special Meeting called for this purpose (Article X).**

From the Board

The QUUF Annual Meeting will be held this year on Sunday, June 10th, immediately after the second service in the church sanctuary. A quorum of at least 30 percent of active members must be physically present to transact business at the meeting, so please plan to attend. Members who cannot attend may give another member the power to fill out a ballot and vote for them using a proxy form, although these votes will not count toward the quorum. Proxy forms are currently available in the rear of the sanctuary.

Check in and obtain a ballot or proxy form in the breezeway between first and second service and immediately preceding the meeting.

There is no provision for nominations from the floor at the meeting.

ELECTION TO THE SPECIAL FUNDS COMMITTEE proposed by the Nominating Committee: Lynn Taylor.

ELECTION OF THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Any nominations for this committee are to be made by individual QUUF members from the floor at the annual meeting.

BYLAWS REVISION

The Bylaws committee proposes these substantial changes:

- The Board would no longer review membership applications.
- Candidates for the Nominating Committee would be nominated by the Nominating Committee rather from the floor.
- The Board would be required to have the financial statements reviewed for form and accuracy annually.
- Provisions governing the Permanent Endowment Fund and Development Fund are clarified and moved into the Finance article.
- The Congregation would be able to remove a trustee.
- A non-voting youth liaison position on the Board would be created.
- The Board would no longer approve committee memberships.
- The Board is empowered to appoint special or assistant treasurers.
- The category of Standing Committees is deleted.
- Bylaw amendments could be proposed by a 2/3 vote of the Board or by petition of 10 percent of the members.

STATUS OF THE PLEDGE CAMPAIGN - As of May 7, 161 of last year's 185 pledging units had pledged for a total of \$192,194. As the remaining pledges come in, we hope to reach over \$200,000. With careful budgeting, this will be adequate to continue paying fair compensation to our employees, fund our existing programs, and continue to use a portion of our plate collection for community outreach.

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Leslie Lincoln grew up in a cooperative community of Unitarians and Quakers, Tanguy Homesteads in Pennsylvania. She graduated from the University of Washington in 1984 and later earned her masters degree in anthropology in Vancouver, Canada. Leslie is now a radio electronics officer in the U.S. Merchant Marine and shuttles between California and China.

Brad Snow attended QUUF for several months while living aboard and repairing his boat. Formerly an Alaskan, where he belonged to a UU congregation, he now considers Port Townsend and Quimper UU his home base. Presently, however, Brad is sailing somewhere north of us and plans to be gone for several months. One of Brad's interests is poetry; he attended Bruce's Emily Dickinson class.

Ron and Pam Dionne have been UUs for some time, Pam since 1987 and Ron since the 1970s in Kitsap County. He worked as a pediatrician until he and Pam moved to Port Townsend in 2000. Now Ron works for Allscripts, designing medical software. Pam Dionne is a poet, writer and visual artist. She won a Centrum residency in 1997. She is the inventor of the award-winning game Baffle Gab and president of Discovery Bay Games.

An orientation series of three Wednesday evenings is planned to begin in October, with a Saturday orientation scheduled next February.

Join a Green Project Action Team!

The Green Sanctuary Committee (GSC) has completed an audit of environmental practices at QUUF, surveyed members regarding their top choices of projects to improve these practices, received Board endorsement for these projects and now recommends that QUUF apply for candidacy as a "Green Sanctuary" through the UU Ministry for Earth.

To become a Green Sanctuary, QUUF must complete 12 environmental projects during the next 18 months. The GSC received 131 completed survey forms during the last 3 weeks in April, in which 19 potential projects were listed and other ideas solicited. We combined some of the favorite choices and revised others slightly with the input we received. Unveiled at the service May 20th, they will be presented again to the congregation for adoption at the Annual Meeting June 10th. For each project we will identify a lead person, an action team (perhaps part of an existing committee), an implementation plan and a timeline. If you are interested in helping with any of these projects, please let Kees Kolff know by June 3rd. **To view the proposed projects, visit our website www.quuf.org.**

If your favorite project was not selected, it might be undertaken anyway, like switching to rechargeable batteries for hearing devices, or writing an Eco Column in the monthly QUUF newsletter featuring progress on the different projects. Let's see how green we can get next year.

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PROPOSED BUDGET FOR 2007 - 2008

On the following page, you will find the recommended budget for next fiscal year which will be voted on at the annual meeting. This budget has been approved by the Board.

Please note the following significant changes.

- We project a decrease in current year pledge income of \$4,100 but this will be offset by prior and new year pledge collections.
- We're counting on raising \$20,000 from a service auction.
- We are giving our staff a 3 percent cost of living increase and a modest increase to our youth advisors.
- We will no longer pay property taxes on the new land.
- UUA & PNWD dues are up \$2,000 and the Technology budget has been decreased \$1,750.
- We are planning to hire bookkeeping help for the treasurer.
- We were not able to increase the "Mortgage Placeholder" by the planned \$10,000.
