Guest Speaker: Dr. Patricia Clark. Patricia Clark is Poet-in-Residence and Professor in the Department of Writing at Grand Valley State University in Allendale, Michigan. She is the author of two books of poetry: *My Father on a Bicycle* and *North of Wondering*. She has also co-edited an anthology of contemporary women writers called, *Worlds in Our Words*. Patricia's roots are in the Pacific Northwest, where she graduated from the University of Washington (in economics), going on to receive an MFA in English and creative writing from the University of Montana and a Ph.D. in English from the University of Houston. Currently the Poet Laureate of Grand Rapids, Michigan, Patricia Clark was invited with two other poets to open the Library of Congress's noon reading series in Washington, D.C. in fall 2005.

The Miraculous in the Mundane: Finding a Healthy Spirituality and Encountering the Transcendent in the Everyday Life

Guest Speaker: Dr. Pittman McGehee. Spirituality is the deep human longing to translate the transcendent into the immanent through experience and reflection upon it. This presentation will be centered around the ways we can experience the transcendent and transform the ordinary into the extraordinary.

J. Pittman McGehee received his Master of Divinity from the Virginia Theological Seminary and was ordained as a priest in the Episcopal Church in 1969. He received an honorary Doctor of Divinity from the Episcopal Seminary of the Southwest. Formerly the Dean of Christ Church Cathedral in downtown Houston, he is currently a Diplomate Jungian analyst and the director of the Institute for the Advancement of Psychology and Spirituality. Additionally, he is serving as the Carolyn Fay adjunct lecturer in Analytical Psychology at the University of Houston. Pittman is widely known as a lecturer and educator in the field of psychology and religion, as well as a published poet and essayist.

Dan is joined this week by Ted Kooser, U.S. Poet Laureate from 2004-2006, for readings at the Seattle Art Museum on Thursday, May 24, 7:00 p.m. and Saturday, May 26, 7:00 p.m. at the Wheeler Theater in Fort Worden State Park.

Dan's life has included a good deal of variety – from being a high school teacher, to a professional racecar driver, to a Zen Buddhist monk. He was one of the first authors to explore and document the wild intimacies of competitive auto racing in his 1977 book, *Indy: The World's Fastest Carnival Ride*. Born and raised in Fremont, Michigan, he lives with his wife, Debbie, near the Santa Ynez Valley in California.

Notes on Guest Speakers in May



I try to keep my eye open for authors and workshop leaders visiting our area who would be engaging speakers in our pulpit. Since they are already in the area, it's something our Sunday Services budget can handle. As it happens, there are three such persons, all of whom I know personally, who will be in the Pacific Northwest in May – a veritable treasure trove of fine speakers!

The first is Dr. Patricia Clark, a poet and professor at Grand Valley State University in Allendale, Michigan, and member of the congregation I served in Grand Rapids. On various occasions in my time there, I arranged for her to speak in the pulpit or lead adult education classes.

Patricia already knows Port Townsend, as I discovered by surprise two years ago on a Thanksgiving holiday weekend. She and her husband, Stan Krohmer, also a professor at Grand Valley State University, were in the Landfall Restaurant with family members from Bainbridge Island on the Saturday morning of that weekend. Coincidentally, our entire family was also there for the holiday weekend. We were already sitting down to breakfast when she and I happened to glance in each other's direction, and then both of us did a double-take – she not knowing I now lived in Port Townsend; I not expecting to see her and Stan in our small town. I said, "If I had known you were going to be here this weekend, I'd have invited you to our pulpit." And she: "If I had known you were here, I would have let you know."

So, now, a couple of years later, she and Stan are back, and this time we have made arrangements. Patricia will be giving a poetry reading on **Saturday evening, May 5, at 7 p.m.**, and then giving the message the following morning in the Sunday services.

Our second guest presenter in May is Dr. Pittman McGehee, whom I know from Houston. Dr. McGehee is a Jungian analyst and formerly the Dean of Christ Church Cathedral in downtown Houston. He is currently a Jungian analyst and director of the Institute for the Advancement of Psychology and Spirituality.

I met Pittman as a lecturer for an all-day seminar in connection with a clinical pastoral education class I was taking in the summer of 2004, and we have kept in touch since that time. He will be speaking to the C. G. Jung Society in Seattle on the weekend of May 11 and 12, and then arriving here for Mother's Day, May 13. Following the services on that day, he will be giving a Mother's Day afternoon workshop. I highly recommend him, and think you will find his topic most interesting. His workshop is titled, "The Paradox of Relationships: I Alone Become Myself; I Cannot Become Myself Alone." He will address the four primary relationships in one's life: mother, father, self, and other. (registration form pg 8)

Growth News

On April 1st we as a congregation approved the Program Document that spells out to Richard Berg, our architect, what our hopes and expectations are regarding our expanded space. We also approved the spending of up to \$30,000 for preliminary expenses. The Program Document was formally delivered to Richard later in the month; he, of course, was already quite familiar with it and the task forces' recommendations.

Richard charmed the Building Design/Construction Committee with a concept drawing created to further the permitting process with the city. Even though all the committee members are fully aware that such a drawing is not a plan, eyes brightened and oohs and aahs floated around. It's clear that everyone wants not only utility but also beauty.

As this column goes to the newsletter, committee members are working to evaluate the four contractors still in the running for our project. Each contractor has to be rated by each committee member on a list of selection criteria, which include references from suppliers, subcontractors, and owners. Then the ratings will be compared and the pros and cons of each debated.

On April 18th Kevin Coker, from the JeffCo Built Green organization, gave a talk with lots of Q & A to the committee and other interested persons. We received valuable information that will help us make choices about materials, processes, and even contractors.

One marvels at the immense number of skilled and hard-working folks gathered in this congregation.

Now That You're 70 and a Half

As you probably know, once you hit that rather odd age of 70.5 the government requires you to start taking your money out of your IRA. And, if you've been wondering how to do that wisely, here's an idea.

In addition to withdrawing money from your IRA for your personal needs, the new Pension Protection Act of 2006 also allows you to make contributions to charitable organizations like QUUF directly from your IRA. The amount you give will not be included in your taxable income or subject to withholding.

Previously, if you wanted to use IRA funds for a charitable contribution, you had to withdraw your money from your IRA and then contribute it. The amount you withdrew was taxable and the deduction for the contribution may or may not have offset your tax obligation.

The new law eliminates these untidy provisions, but there are some limitations that must be considered. The gift must be outright and cannot exceed \$100,000 per year. (Too bad!) Further, the 2006 law only governs contributions made in 2006 and 2007.

Green Sanctuary Update

“Life on this planet will be gravely affected unless we embrace new practices, ethics and values to guide our lives on a warming planet”. UUA Statement of Conscience 2006.

In response, QUUF’s new Green Sanctuary Committee (GSC) is focused on how we can better use the current building and grounds to live up to the seventh UU principle: “Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.”

Our purpose is to facilitate our congregation's accreditation, by the national UU Ministry for Earth, as a Green Sanctuary; a congregation that lives out its commitment to the Earth by creating a more sustainable life style for its members as individuals and as a community.

The benefits of the Green Sanctuary accreditation process are:

- generating commitment for personal lifestyle changes
- motivating community action on environmental issues
- building a connection between spiritual practice and environmental consciousness
- reducing our use of precious resources and our negative impact on the environment.

We just completed an Environmental Audit (posted on the website) to provide a snapshot of where the congregation stands with respect to green behaviors. Some positive results include:

- our energy use per square foot is comparable to other churches,
- we do fairly well in recycling,
- we don’t use pesticides or herbicides,
- we use cloth napkins and washable dishes, and
- RE programs and services often include reference to Earth stewardship.

On the other hand:

- we have few written policies to motivate greener behaviors
- we have no social action projects relating to the environment
- 83% of us come to church by fossil fuel powered car, although almost half of us live less than 2 miles from QUUF.

To be accredited we must complete twelve environmental projects during the next year or so. We just conducted a survey of potential projects and thank those who participated.

What next? At the services on Sunday, May 20, the Green Sanctuary Committee and Reverend Bode will focus on our call as individuals and as a community to respond to the condition of our planet earth and to the current climate crisis. Proposed objects for accreditation will be unveiled and the congregation will be asked to approve them later at the Annual Meeting in June. Stay tuned! There will be many opportunities for creative participation over the ensuing months as we work together to live more lightly on the Earth!

From the Board

QUUF Bylaws Revision

The QUUF bylaws provide that every five years a committee be formed to review the bylaws. The Board appointed Linda Little (chair), David Alvarez and Megan Cate to undertake this task. The committee invites you to a discussion on **May 6** right after the 12:15 service to learn about the proposed changes. These changes will be voted on at the Annual Meeting. Most changes involve minor edits to create consistency in use of terms or to reorganize sections. Substantive changes include:

- eliminating “Standing” committees,
- having the Nominating Committee propose a slate of candidates for the Nominating Committee in the same way this committee proposes a slate for the Board and the Special Funds Committee,
- setting term limits and clarifying functions of Nominating Committee,
- creating a youth liaison Board position,
- authorizing Assistant Treasurers,
- establishing a quorum for Board votes,
- providing that committees shall obtain prior Board approval for issuing public statements,
- specifying requirements for the receipt and expenditure of Special Fund monies.

The revised bylaws are available for review in the QUUF website in a format showing the changes, the reason for the changes and the proposed final version.

Please have a look and then plan to attend this meeting.

Designated Offerings

The Designated Offering Committee has selected two wonderful groups to receive the "plate" in May:

On the second Sunday, May 13 (Mother's Day), we are reaching out to victims of sexual assault in our county. The offering will go to the **Domestic Violence / Sexual Assault Program of Jefferson County**. This group offers legal advocacy, housing, medical emergency assistance, and education. They operate a lovely emergency shelter (a former B&B) which can house up to 12 people who need to escape the violence in their lives.

On the fourth Sunday, May 27, we are supporting **West Camp for Girls**. This non-profit organization provides leadership skills, constructive risk-taking and fun to local girls who need a break from stress-filled lives. The cost for a girl to attend is \$249, and while families contribute something, no girl is turned down for lack of expenses. Our offering will help support these girls at camp.

We plan to start again in September with the twice-a-month schedule.
